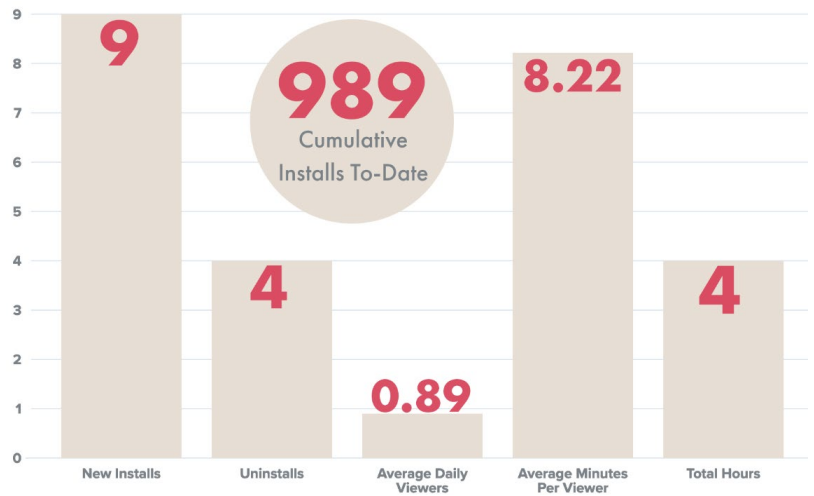

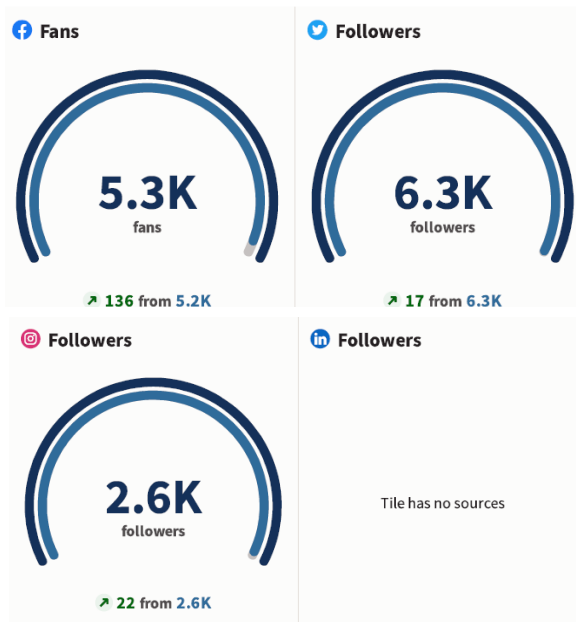

# POLICE

## HIGHLIGHTS

- **Community/Department Activities**

- **August 6:** The Police Department had our annual Open House. Citizens took tours of the station police vehicles, K-9 and drone demonstrations, and displayed SWAT equipment. We estimate that we had over 1,000 people attend throughout the day.
- **August 9:** Lights On! Press conference to launch a citizen driven program which allows officers to hand out light vouchers to citizens to have lights replaced on their vehicle.
- **August 14:** Officers worked a special detail providing security at the Jewish Festival. There were no major issues and the event was successful.
- **August 15:** Matt Howell and Janie Mazingo were sworn in as new police officers.
- **August 18:** Cadet Zakree Wilson (department sponsored) graduated from the Eastern Missouri Police Academy.
- **August 22:** Members of the police department held a Meet and Greet at New Town.
- **August 26:** The Police Department attended the city wide staff meeting presented by the City Administrator and Mayor.
- **August 26:** A citizen contacted the department, via Facebook, to thank Officer Alexander for responding to a call where her 7 year old got off at the wrong bus stop and a woman called 911 to help her daughter. Her daughter was embarrassed and hiding in the car. She is a police dispatcher for Washington University Police Department and asked Officer Alexander to speak to her daughter. He proceeded to ask her what her favorite animal was and already had a bag full of beanie babies to give her. She commended Officer Alexander for having such things readily available if and when dealing with kids. She also thanked the telecommunications for how quickly the call was handled.

- **Notable Incidents**

- **August 1:** The victim was on break and smoking in her vehicle at Lewis and Clark Assisted Living, with the door open, when a black male suspect appeared at her door, brandishing a pistol demanding her car keys. The suspect was described as a 40 year old, bald black male, wearing a black shirt and blue jean shorts. The victim stated she didn't have them or her purse and the suspect grabbed her phone and left in a red Jeep SVU. The victim got the first two characters of the license plate. The information was relayed by our dispatch and a Creve Coeur Officer observed the vehicle which failed to yield. On Spodee Road, the suspect vehicle parked the vehicle in a driveway and the driver fled on foot. The driver was finally apprehended but he doesn't match the original suspect description. Sgt. Jackson notified and will have a Detective interview the above suspect.
- **August 1:** Units responded to a fire, on Rue Street, in which the elderly homeowner was still inside. Officer Foust arrived and made entry, locating the victim unresponsive. Officer Foust removed the female to the porch where the Fire Department assisted in moving her to the front lawn. Life saving measures were unsuccessful. A dog and cat also perished in the fire. Animal control responded to take the remains of the animals.
- **August 6:** A family disturbance at a pavilion near the pool of Blanchette Park, led to a shots fired call. While Officers arrived on scene, numerous vehicles were leaving the area. No victims were located at the scene. During a canvas of the grassy area between the pavilions, two shell casings were located.

## HIGHLIGHTS

- **Notable Incidents – continued**

- **August 7:** The suspect had a verbal argument with his mother and girlfriend, who left the apartment, on Ruger Circle. After the mother and girlfriend left, the suspect fired 2-3 shots into the floor of his apartment (floor level). The suspect exited the apartment and sat on a bench near the parking lot while holding a firearm. The suspect was located sitting on the bench wearing a ballistic vest and firearm in a holster. The suspect eventually walked into the parking lot towards his apartment, where a contact team stopped him in the parking lot. The suspect eventually removed his belt/holster and was taken into custody without incident. The suspect was transported to St. Joseph's for a psych evaluation.
- **August 7:** Three subjects were shooting targets in their back yard with a .22 caliber rifle. All three were arrested for Discharging a Firearm in City Limits.
- **August 15:** During an arranged SWAT vehicle assault, at Best Western, the suspect escaped containment and proceeded SB on S. Fifth. Officer Fischer deployed department stop sticks at the S. Fifth/EB 70 ramp that was effective. DTF and SWAT personnel maintained surveillance as the vehicle tires rapidly deteriorated. Officer Fischer activated his emergency equipment on 70 at Hwy 141 after speeds reduced to approximately 35 mph and maintained visual. The vehicle became disabled in lane 3 EB 70 at Airport Rd. and a felony stop was conducted by Officers Fischer, Benisch, and Christeson that involved pistol display. A large amount of methamphetamine and fentanyl was seized from inside the vehicle. DEA is assisting in the investigation.
- **August 17:** Sgt. Kohler was working the Criminal Interdiction Task Force when he observed a suspicious vehicle on N. Benton Ave. The suspect, who was intoxicated, refused lawful commands and resisted arrest. The suspect was ultimately pulled from the vehicle and taken to the ground by Sgt. Kohler & Officer Fruits. Once in the rear of Sgt. Kohler's patrol vehicle, the suspect began banging his head. The suspect sustained a laceration to his forehead and was later transported to St. Joseph's E.R. for medical care. The suspect also matched the description from Assault Report, which was taken earlier in the night at Moto Mart (1020 S. 5th Street).
- **August 19:** A traffic crash involving city light pole that was knocked down. Street department responded, as the pole covered the sidewalk and had exposed wires. The driver was identified and Officer Scanga completed the accident report.
- **August 20:** Three subjects were engaged in a fight, on N. Main St., which resulted in two subjects ending up on the ground. Empty hand control by Officer Fruits and Sgt. Kohler to stop an active fight and to take one subject into custody.
- **August 21:** The victim had a past history of suicide attempts. The victim's son, last spoke to his father on August 17th. Entry was made, into the secure apartment on Mossberg Court, and the victim was found deceased in his bedroom. A note and documents were located on the kitchen table. Detective Bureau was notified.

## HIGHLIGHTS

- **Notable Incidents – continued**

- **August 24:** Multiple motion alarms went off at the Bass Pro Shops and the first officer on the scene, Officer Mauzy, found a broken window on the west side. K-9 Officer Gresham also responded but the building was found to be empty. Video showed two vehicles circling the area and then the two suspects parked near the southwest corner of the building and walk up to the window. They break the window and both crawl inside. They jogged to the gun counter and observed that all the guns were put away. They kept jogging and climbed back out the broken window and drove east towards the 5th Street exit. Officer Sansone did recover some nice fingerprints off the broken window. Neither suspect wore gloves.
- **August 24:** The victim was driving home when two male suspects stepped out in front of him stopping him on Mel Wetter just north of Olive Street. They had just gotten out of a vehicle being driven south on Mel Wetter by an unknown driver. The suspect near the driver's side told him to get out of the vehicle as the passenger's side suspect moved behind the vehicle. The victim got out of the vehicle and the two suspects got in his rental car and drove north on Mel Wetter. The suspect vehicle continued south on Mel Wetter. The victim called his wife to pick him up and called the police department 20 minutes after the incident.
- **August 25:** Officers responded to Monroe Elementary school to assist the Fire Department for smoke in a classroom. All students and staff were evacuated safely. The source of the smoke was an A/C window unit in one classroom. No damage to school property or injuries.
- **August 25:** Property belonging to the victim was discovered in a bush, two doors down from the victim's residence, which included his wallet and US currency. The victim's residence was found to be unlocked and a search for him inside the home was negative. An area canvass was also negative. The victim's relatives were contacted and responded to the residence to aid officers. The victim lives alone, has a history of wandering away from home and suffers from Dementia and Alzheimer's along with other medical issues. A Missouri Silver Advisory form was completed. The victim was located in a thick wood line near his residence stuck in a ditch. He stated he had been there since the overnight hours.
- **August 25:** A delayed report of a domestic assault with a firearm that occurred on S. Old Highway 94. The boyfriend of the victim had assaulted the victim after forcing his way into the hotel room, then pointing a gun at the victim threatening to kill her. The suspect then stole \$800, from her purse, then left the scene to return later and damage the front passenger window of her vehicle. ID Officer Yoho took photographs of the victim's injuries.
- **August 26:** An unknown suspected coaxed an 11 year old, mentally challenged, female victim to take nude and partially nude photos of herself and send them to her/him. The victim's phone was seized and the victim's mother signed a consent form for it to be downloaded. The report was forwarded to the Detective Bureau for investigation which is ongoing.

## HIGHLIGHTS

- **Notable Incidents – continued**

- **August 26:** Units responded to Tru Hotel and Streets of St. Charles for two subjects checking car door handles. An area check was negative for the subjects. Security checked surveillance video and discovered they arrived in a silver/gray passenger vehicle and left on S 5th St. prior to police arrival. About 30 min later, units responded to Cabana West Apartments for several subjects checking car door handles. Units arrived and located three black male subjects who took off on foot while they dropped property. Two subjects were quickly apprehended. When taken into custody, one subject had a handgun on his person. An area canvas located several vehicles tampered with. Additionally, a stolen vehicle from a carjacking on Melwetter/Duchesne was recovered near Building 11. Shortly after the stolen auto was towed away, another suspect walked around the corner of Building 11 and was taken into custody by Officer Yoho.
- **August 27:** The suspect was released from our holdover around 0800 hours after being held for Bridgeton on their municipal charges. The suspect exposed himself to 2 minors (employees at Subway Regency Plaza) and Officer Gresham took a report. From his release until his arrest, the suspect stole items from Walmart, West Marine, Walgreens and a couple of other stores that would not prosecute. The suspect was located on a bicycle, presumed stolen due to the fact he was released without one, on Fairgrounds. The suspect attempted to flee on the bicycle, but was not able to negotiate a curb and fell to the ground. Empty hand control was used to take the suspect into custody.
- **August 27:** An intoxicated subject handled his firearm and accidentally shot himself in the hand. His fiancé was in the backyard when the shot happened. The victim was transported to Barnes- St. Louis and taken into surgery.
- **August 28:** Officer Mauzy observed an active disturbance near the area of West Clay and Boone. He then discovered the female victim was suffering from mental illness and was self-harming herself. The victim was transported to the hospital and admitted for psychological observation.
- **August 31:** A St. Peters Officer, working the Criminal Interdiction Task Force, attempted to stop a U-Haul pick-up truck at Cave Springs & E70, although it failed to yield. Officers Pham and Benisch were two-man working the Task Force and became the second car on E70 & Zumbahl Road. The pick-up was spiked by County TF Officers near 5th Street. The truck continued with flat tires but ultimately stopped on E70 near Natural Bridge. During a felony stop, Benisch displayed his duty pistol at the passenger.
